






CHECK OUT OUR SPANISH AND ARABIC LANGUAGE COLLECTIONS!

Table for Two by Amor Towles

Amor Towles has a new book coming out in April, and if it's anything like his previous books, you'll want to get yourself on a hold list for it immediately. Readers will recall Towles as the author of past smash hits such as A Gentleman in Moscow and The Lincoln Highway. The new book, Table for Two, is a slight departure in that it is a short story collection, not a novel.

Six of the short stories are set in New York City around the year 2000. The book also includes a novella that features Evelyn Ross, a character from his previous novel Rules of Civility, in Los Angeles during the Golden Age of Hollywood in the late 1930s.

Now, I am generally not a short story person. I tend to prefer full-length novels, though lately I've read some short story collections that have been challenging that perception. Dune by Frank Herbert

If you are into sci-fi epics, you will be excited to know that the Dune Part 2 movie will be releasing on March 1. It is the seguel to the Part 1 movie released back in 2021. Its release has been highly anticipated, since the first grossed \$402 million worldwide and had highly favorable reviews. The movies are based off of Dune. the first book in a science-fiction series written by Frank Herbert and still continued to this day by his son, Brian Herbert, and author Kevin J. Anderson. It was originally published as serials in Analog Magazine from 1963-1965.

What follows is a story of betrayal, adventure, and fate.

This epic is set 20,000 years into our future, when humans have spread across the universe. It is the coming of age story of Paul Atreides, the fifteen-year-old son of Duke Leto of House Atreides. 


