From the Director's Corner:

A phrase the you'll hear a lot around my house this time of year is, "Reading is reading." We all love participating in the library's Summer Reading Programs, and we get our reading in any way that we can. We read physical books. We read e-books on various devices. We listen to audiobooks in the car. We take turns with the kids reading to each other at night. My daughter even reads us a braille book once in a while. All of it counts for summer reading, and we sure do rack up the minutes!

Sometimes people ask me if audiobooks should really count as reading, or if magazines or graphic novels count. Some people think it shouldn't count if you aren't doing the reading yourself or if you aren't reading big blocks of text or if you aren't flipping the pages of an actual book. While not all reading is the same, all reading is still reading.

One of the best examples of this is a program that our library participates in called 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten. The aim of this program is to encourage all children to have read 1,000 books before they begin kindergarten, so that they have a strong foundation of literacy even before they get to

school. But how are little children supposed to read before they ever start school? Lots of ways!

Obviously, kids can be read to. They soak up language like a sponge, and exposing them to a wide variety of stories at a young age fosters a growing understanding of phonics, vocabulary, diction, and story structure that are the foundations of literacy. Kids also learn a lot by flipping through picture books or following along as they are being read to. Some kids even like to chew on their books, which is probably less effective but always gets points for enthusiasm.

The point is, reading is good for young minds, and it doesn't much matter how that reading happens. It's also good for old minds and everyone in between.



Desperate and running out of time, Viv frees a dragon. In doing so, she starts a civil war. When Vivien is offered a job as a codebreaker to help win the war, she can't turn it down. Especially when her family is at stake.
